WHAT TO DO *RIGHT NOW* WHEN YOU
FIND OUT YOUR CHILD IS GAMBLING

Here's what to focus on first:

1. Pause before you act



Your instinct is to confront them immediately. We get it—we did the same thing. But coming in hot usually backfires. Give yourself an hour, a walk, or a phone call to someone who won't judge. Let the first wave pass so you can approach from "I want to understand" instead of "I need to make this stop."

2. Protect your finances—today



We know—you came here to help your child, and we're going to get there. But this step can't wait. This isn't about mistrust. It's about removing the fuel while your child gets help.

- Lock up credit cards, checkbooks, and account info
- Freeze your credit with Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion
- Limit their access to cash and payment apps

3. Don't bail them out



This is brutal, but important: paying off their debt or smoothing over consequences keeps the cycle going. It teaches them that gambling doesn't have real consequences—and takes away their motivation to change. Stay connected. Stay loving. But let natural consequences do their teaching.

4. Get support for yourself



You can't do this alone—and you shouldn't have to. Connecting with other parents who've been through this means you can ask questions, learn what's worked (and what hasn't), and stop feeling like you're the only one.



5. When you're ready, have the conversation



Lead with curiosity, not confrontation. Ask "Help me understand what's been going on" instead of "What were you thinking?" For most young people, gambling isn't really about the money—it's about escaping stress or numbing hard feelings. You don't need all the answers right now. Just keep the door open.

6. Find professional help
